Greetings!

I hope this newsletter finds you and your family well.

I think the question on everyone's mind as we come into the second month of 2021 is "How long, O Lord?" We're coming up on a one-year anniversary of the word "normal" becoming obsolete. And, all of us want to return to some kind of normal—of not the old, familiar normal, then some kind of "new" normal. So, when?

Let me share our process on the Lead team. We review the COVID statistics for Mercer County every time we're together. The Lead Team has made the decision that as long as we are in the "red" on the kentucy Covid 19 Map, we will try to follow the Red County Guidelines for Kentucky Counties.

Those guidelines are:

Employers allow employees to work from home when possible

Non-critical Government offices to operate virtually

Reduce in-person shopping; order online or curbside pickup

Order take-out; avoid dining in restaurants or bars

Prioritize businesses that follow and enforce mask mandate and other guidelines

Reschedule, postpone or cancel public and private events

Do not host or attend gatherings of any size

Avoid non-essential activities outside of your home


Reduce overall activity and contacts, and follow existing guidance, including 10 steps to defeat COVID-19 I have put the last four in bold type, to highlight the ones that seem to apply to our situation.

Our current incidence rate here in Mercer County is 41. At the beginning of January, the number for Mercer County was 115 The boundary between yellow and red is 25. So you can see, we have come quite a way toward "normal," but we have a way to go yet. AS SOON AS it is safe enough, we will be resuming our in-person services—first on an every other week basis, and then as soon as we can, every week.

BUT.... The new normal will still not be like the comfortable, familiar, old normal. We will still sit socially distanced. We will still wear masks. We will not be able to have the choir, nor will we be able to have congregational singing. All of those non-normal circumstances will pass in time, but we will have to endure them for a bit as society gets back up on its feet.

So, "hold fast to what you have" until the time comes for us to be in worship together. Don't forget—we have a new service every week online through Facebook, as well as an online Bible study via Webex. There are still ways for us to keep connected to one another.

2021 Budget Discussion

The proposed budget is based on actual spending for 2020 with adjustments for abnormal situations. The new budget is about \$4812 more than the actual spending in 2020. At present the 2021 budget is \$176,063. The budget is based on assumptions we made about the new year and operations. For example, we will not have in-person church services until June 2nd. We will have virtual services for the period of January to May. For June and July, in-person services will be every other Sunday (having 2-in-person services in June and 2 in July). Our apportionments have been reduced to 10% and Bluegrass District at 1.5% of our general fund income. If you recall the conference treasurer suspended collection for apportionments for two months and suspended payments for Pastors Health Insurance and Pension for three months. These reductions help to keep us going. Also, because the Annual Conference was virtual it saved us about \$1000 for the Pastor and Conference Delegate on travel & hotel expenses.

Our Worship Leader (Mike Barnard), our organist (Gene Robertson), and our custodian (Debbie Blankenship) will not take salaries while we are not meeting in-person service. Based on the assumptions those people will be paid half wages for June and July. Their regular salary will be paid from August through December. If the in-person services are moved up or pushed back, we will adjust the budget accordingly.

Lastly, we have reorganized our budget process and can make changes easily with our reporting as our environment changes. For the 2021 budget, we will need an average weekly income of \$3,297. So far for the first four Sundays, our Income offering has been only \$8,205, we needed \$13,188 to fully fund the new budget. We are \$4,983 behind. So, I encourage everyone to continue to provide their tithes and offerings to cover our expenses. I don't want us to fall behind. God Bless.

Valentine Customs Around the World

Germany—You'll also be surprised to find pigs aplenty on the day for romance since the animal is a symbol of luck and lust. Couples will give each other pig figurines and pictures, and even chocolate pigs. While chocolate is Americans' dessert of choice on Valentine's Day, Germans nibble on heart-shaped ginger cookies with romantic messages written in icing.

South Korea—Men do most of the gift-giving on Valentine's Day in the United States, but the opposite is true in South Korea, where women give chocolate to the men in their lives. A month later, on White Day, men return the favor by giving candy. But that's not the end of it—single friends sometimes get together on Black Day on April 14 to eat black noodles.

Italy—Unlike the United States, where classmates and families exchange cards, Italy celebrates Valentine's Day as a lovers-only holiday, says Schweitzer. Baci Perugina chocolates, which have a romantic message written inside the foil, make for a popular gift. "Baci' means 'kiss' in Italian," says Schweitzer. "When they exchange the Baci Perugina—a little box of those small hazelnut chocolates—they're exchanging kisses."

Denmark—Instead of red roses, snowdrops are a popular flower choice on Valentine's Day in Denmark. Danish men also sometimes send women funny poems called gaekkebrev, signed anonymously with a series of dots. If the receiver can guess who sent the letter, he'll give her an Easter egg later in the year.

Slovenia—Things aren't all lovey dovey in Slovenia, where St. Valentine is known as the patron saint of spring. With plants starting to grow, people can get back to work in the fields. With mating season starting, tradition also says the birds of the fields "marry" on February 14.

Brazil—Instead of celebrating St. Valentine, Brazilians honor St. Anthony, the patron saint of marriage and matchmaking, on June 12. The night before, single women will write men's names on pieces of paper then fold them up. In the morning, they pick a slip to reveal their future husbands.
